On Sunday morning, December 18, the First Parish Sanctuary Choir, directed by Rip Jackson, will present a special Music Sunday celebrating the winter solstice at the 10:30 am service. Through beautiful music and poetry, the powerful transformation from darkness to light will be uplifted. Artist and soprano sax player Katie Runde and contrabassist Ben Green will be the guest instrumentalists. Together with Rip Jackson, they will play some of the music from the Paul Winter Consort that can be heard at St. John the Divine during the Winter Solstice Concerts there each December, including the rousing piece "Dancing Day." The sanctuary choir will also sing deep and mystical settings of solstice poetry and other seasonal music.



On Christmas Eve, beautiful music will adorn both the 5 pm and 7 pm candlelight worship services at First Parish in Lexington. For the 5 pm family service, the children's choir will sing music from "A Charlie Brown Christmas." There will be two boy soprano soloists, Andreas Padilla and Mckenna O'Hare Gibson. A group of high school musicians from the church will sing a calypso carol and there will be jazz Christmas music for the centering and postlude. For the 7 pm Candlelight service, the sanctuary choir will sing Christmas carols by John Rutter. Elizabeth Walsh, Julia Jaffe, and Jamie Willis will sing solos with accompaniment of harp, flute, horn, clarinet and piano. Martha Moor will be the guest harpist. For both services, the congregation will sing familiar Christmas carols to celebrate the season.

Special Plate Donation Sunday, December 11th



On December 11th, the donation plate will be given to Lexington Refugee Assistance Program. LexRAP is a grass roots organization that started a little over a year ago when Marianne

Boswell sent an email to the Lexington Listserv and to FP Chat expressing distress over the exploding refugee crisis in the Middle East and Europe, wondering how we can help. The response was tremendous, and a group formed to explore what could be done that is hands-on and tangible.

Lexington has a strong history of supporting refugees. Many from FP were active leaders in the 80's housing and support of Cambodian refugees. LexRAP learned that there are strict international laws defining that "refugees are people fleeing conflict or persecution." Before achieving refugee status, people must apply to and be vetted by the UN. Next, they get assigned to one of 20 countries, and, for the U.S., cleared through Homeland Security. The process usually takes years during which time people live in camps in terrible conditions. From the UNHCR: "An unprecedented 65.3 million people around the world have been forced from home. Among them are nearly 21.3 million refugees, half of whom are under the age over 18." Unaccompanied minors are kids in camps who have no parents or guardians and come here and live in foster homes.

By the time refugees arrive in the U.S., they are often without money or resources. Even though someone with refugee status arrives with the right to work and receive food stamps, the financial aid is small and assistance ends in months. We also learned that people fleeing and arriving in the U.S. without going through the UN and US vetting are called asylum seekers. These people have no legal status in the U.S. – no right to work or receive government aid until they prove their refugee status. Asylum seekers can live with families and LexRAP has provided financial support to asylees being hosted by families in the area.

As an organization, LexRAP has applied and is waiting for Federal 501c status as a non profit. We have begun a tutoring program for families and for unaccompanied minors. LexRAP is working with five refugee families, helping them find housing and providing support as they find their way. LexRAP also works with resettlement agencies, all of which are stretched for resources. Currently, we have one asylee living in Lexington, for whom we provide monetary support. The person arrived and needed warm clothes and Lexingtonians donated sweaters, coats, and boots. Jane and Bob Eckert gave bike riding lessons and First Parish responded with offers of bikes, and now the asylee has wheels! We would like to be able to support more asylees and there are families in the area ready and willing to open their homes but LexRAP does not have the funds to do this. And, come the New Year, we will be launching a laptop donation drive so that we can give refugees, asylum seekers and unaccompanied minors laptops.

Munroe Saturday Nights

Beginning on December 7th, the First Parish Art Gallery in Parish Hall will feature photographs from the *Boston Beings* series by Will Gibbons, which will run through January 31st. Will writes:

"On September 24th 2014, I started walking around Denver with my camera. I didn't really know where I was going. I was new to Denver and wanted to get to know the city better through its people. I took strangers' pictures and talked with them. What brought them to this part of Denver? What brought them to Denver in general? The conversations took off from there. I approached almost anyone I saw, though I gravitated towards people sitting by themselves. I heard their stories and became attached to these people. Their words stuck with me. I saw them days and weeks and months after we first met—sometimes in completely different parts of the city—and took new pictures and had new conversations.

In July 2015, I moved back to Boston and began the same project here. I wanted to use my camera again as an excuse to

hear people's stories and listen. I wanted to stop and meet all the people I'd usually walk by without approaching."
