## Worship Services for June What Does it Mean to be a Community of Joy?




### June 4, Rev. Anne Mason "Courage for Joy"

This is my final Focalpoint column as your Board Chair. At the June 13th Board meeting, the Board will elect a new Chair, and I will transition to ex-officio Board member, which, according to the First Parish Bylaws, "serves the purpose of supporting the new Chairperson during his/her first year as s/he transitions into the role as well as provide for institutional continuity." It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as Chair the past two years.

I am especially pleased that my term is ending with our Capital Campaign in full swing. As previously announced, we will conduct this campaign in two phases. The goal for Phase I is to raise \$300,000 by the end of June 2017 to fund a building restoration program carefully planned by First Parish's Building and Grounds Committee, based on the Historic Structures Report conducted a year ago. I want to thank the Phase I planning team, in particular its Chair, David Bovet. The other members are Bob Gibbons, Elisabeth Jas, Deb Lapidés, and David Rose.

Phase II will begin in the fall, when we will start a congregation-wide discussion on what we as a congregation wants to be; that is, First Parish's mission and vision for the future. Achieving that long-term vision will require changes and improvements to the building, which will be a focus of Phase II of the Capital Campaign, along with other measures that will help secure the long-term financial health of our church.

- Moving the History Room to the first floor, and moving the Music Director's office to the balcony level, plus creating a Music Library room next door (Music and History Committees)

The recipient for June's Special Plate Collection is METCO, Inc., a voluntary school desegregation program that began over 50 years ago in Boston. According to President Charles E. Walker, Jr.,

*"10,000 black, brown, white, urban, suburbanites, parents demanding equal access to quality public school educations led it in 1963. In 2017, 51 [sic] years and three generations later, these same grand, and great parents are demanding an end to achievement gaps and the statewide elimination of all racially imbalanced and racially isolated schools."*

The plate collection will take place on Sunday, June 4th.
