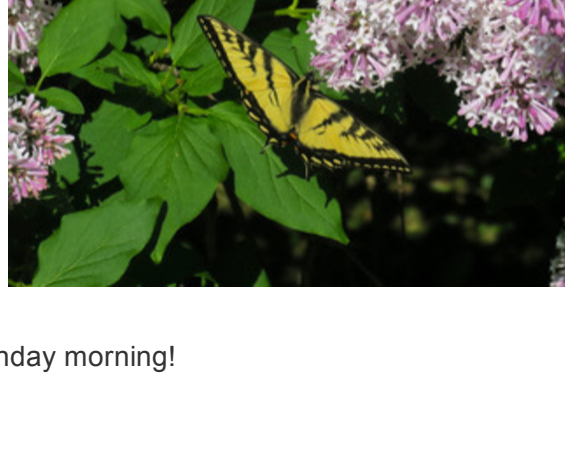
Note from Rev. Anne Mason

Sunday, March 29 at 10:30

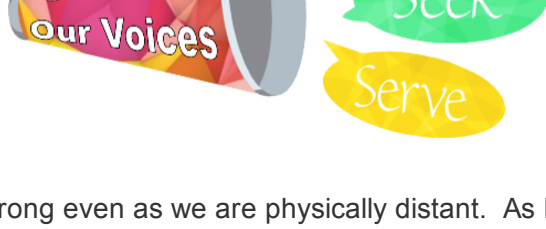

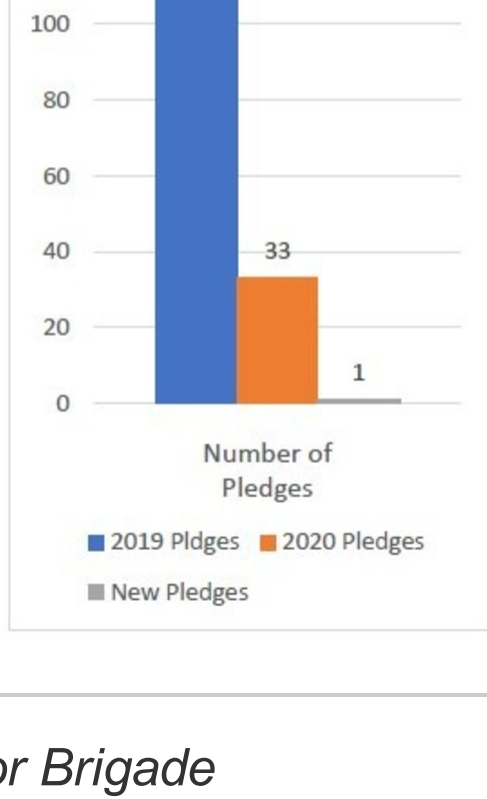
As we have met with each other over Zoom and YouTube during Sunday services or had online team meetings to continue the many church activities, we remember that our connections stay

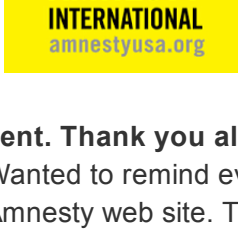
Support of voting rights and voter awareness can continue now from home as our individual circumstances permit. Online information about UU the Vote and an email list are available.

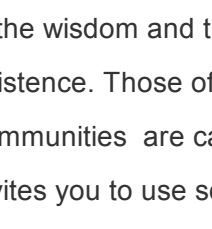
Dear First Parish Community,

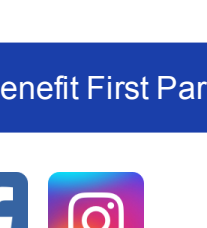
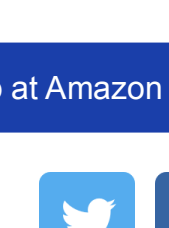
The Condor & The Eagle [Watch the trailer](#): Four Indigenous environmental leaders embark on an extraordinary trans-continental adventure from the Boreal forest to deep into the heart of the Amazonian jungle to unite the peoples of North and South America and deepen the meaning of "Climate Justice". The Condor & The Eagle documentary offers a glimpse into a developing spiritual renaissance as the film's four protagonists learn from each other's long legacy of resistance to colonialism and its extractive economy. Their path through the jungle takes them on an unexpectedly challenging and liberating journey, which will forever change their attachment to the Earth and one another.

The Condor & The Eagle premiered in October 2019 at the Woodstock Film Festival, was selected by 28 world-renowned film festivals and has won 8 awards

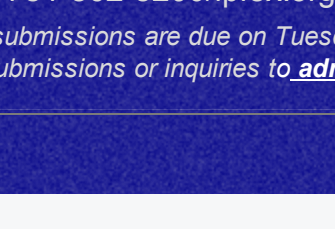
Environmental Voter Project

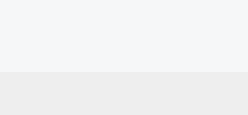
