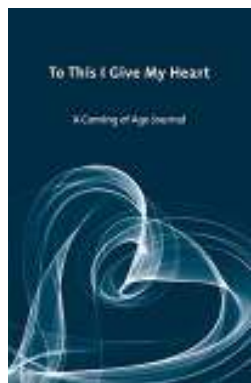

### May 7, 9th and 10th Grade Youth Coming of Age

From Your Minister

This month we explore what it means to have our faith as an 'embodied' faith. **Yukino Sekino Piano Concert**

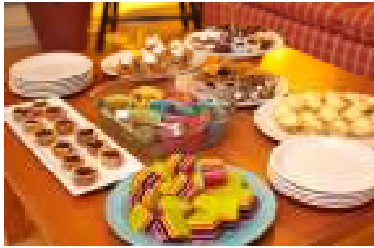
**Sunday, June 11, 2017 at 2pm**

Pianist Yukino Sekino will give a solo piano recital at the First Parish in Lexington on Sunday, June 11<sup>th</sup>, at 2pm. Works will include Chopin's Etudes, Op. 25, Copland's Piano Variations, preludes by David Rakowski, and sonatas by Scarlatti. Yukino plays piano for First Parish worship services in the summer. The Gold Medalist of the 2006 International Russian Music Piano Competition and a winner of the S&R Foundation's Washington Award, she has performed as a soloist and a chamber musician in the United States, Europe, Japan, and China. Currently, she is piano faculty at the New England Conservatory's Preparatory School and School of Continuing Education, and an Affiliate Artist at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Suggested Donation: \$10.



Amazing music will be sung and played by a very talented group of singers and instrumentalists. Our choirs are included in the list of performing artists. How can we make this major event at First Parish even more successful? Donating refreshments, that's how!

On Friday, April 7, the First Parish *Voices on the Green* presented its second program, “Balancing on the Hyphen,” a rich exploration of living multicultural-ly. The title is taken from *Together Tea*, a book by Marjan Kamali, one of the evening’s storytellers. More than 160

people heard storytellers and featured speaker First Parish member Dr. Mary Brinton talk about the challenges and rewards of their multicultural heritages and experiences.

The evening was created in partnership with the Lexington Youth and Family Services, a counseling service for teens which meets at First Parish. Teenage and adult LYFS Board members and their families helped create the evening and provided a table of delicious international food. Ruth Rose managed the feast.

Speakers reflected on widely different experiences. FP member Larry Prusak described a Brooklyn of the 40’s and 50’s in which “everybody was hyphenated,” Italian-Americans, Jewish-Americans, African-Americans, and others. The groups engaged with one another, not always without conflict, but with a sense that they all belonged.



FP member Shawna Yen immigrated to the U.S. from Taiwan at the age of four, growing up “at home” as an American, but realizing that her Asian features mean that some white Americans have trouble seeing her as a fellow citizen.



Austin Fowlkes, an African-American student from Boston at Lexington High School, moving-ly recounted a difficult experience in class when some white students made assumptions about his dancing interests and skills.

Marjan Kamali, author of *Together Tea*, and her daughter Mona Tavangar spoke about being Iranian-American. Marjan, an immigrant, and Mona, a first-generation teenager, talked about the ways in which their experiences are related but also different.



Mary Brinton, Chair of Harvard’s Sociology Department, grew up in the U.S. and fell in love with Japan at

twenty, a passion which led her to learn Japanese and shaped her scholarly career. Her experiences of her home and her “chosen” countries enrich and complicate her understanding of human groups and of herself.



The band, Paint Mine Medicine Show, led by LYFS board member Geoff Keith, provided music enhancing the theme, including “An Englishman in New York,” “That’s Right, You’re Not from Texas,” and “Wayfaring Stranger.”

The Rev. Anne Mason concluded the program, observing that “Unitarian-Universalists” balance on the hyphen, and expressing appreciation for all who contributed to the evening.

The VOG committee thanks Munroe Saturday Nights for providing the curtain and lights, Bill Pittore for the sound system, and First Parish members who provided food and attended the evening. \$1000 of the proceeds will go to LYFS, \$500 to fund future VOG programs.
